OLD KINDERGARTEN REUNION

2024 saw a new event – A reunion July 5, 2024, for former students of the Old Kindergarten Schoolhouse which now serves as our primary museum. The building was constructed in 1888 and served as a school until 1970. More than 90 alumni, who came with family and friends, stopped by to share memories, view special displays, look for themselves in class pictures and yearbooks, and reunite with friends. People listed their homes from throughout Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, and Illinois, as well as Texas, Florida, California, Pennsylvania, Alabama, Tennessee, Arizona, South Carolina, and even British Columbia, Canada. Donna Smerz was from the Class of 1937 and Betty Raveret, Class of 1939, with students from every decade thereafter until the school closed. Most visitors had Mrs. Mullin as their teacher. Another former teacher and historical society board member, Terry Derleth, helped plan the event and was on hand to greet some of her former students. In all, about 150 people toured the museum and enjoyed the day.


BRATS! BRATS! BRATS!

She wrote and published three local historical books, two with Andy.



TAHS, and Tomahawk in general, lost another precious friend Sept. 15, 2024, with the passing of Elaine Koth, 85. She spent countless hours researching and putting together binders that traced the histories of Tomahawk building ownership. She also helped publish two books "Souvenir Views of Tomahawk, Wisconsin" and "The Story of Tomahawk's Saloons, Bootlegging, Taverns and Bars."

In July, Tomahawk Main Street and the Tomahawk Area Historical Society hosted TomaWalk, a stroll down our historical streets to celebrate days gone by. "From comments, we felt it went well and would like to do it again next year," TAHS President Pat Pietila says.

In August, TAHS had a table at National Night Out, promoted by the Tomahawk Chamber. National Night Out features police, business and community partnerships with a variety of activities for the whole family. Next year's event will be Aug. 5, 2025.

TAHS is joining the celebration of the 150th Anniversary of Lincoln County. There will be items in a Tomahawk Leader special edition. Bootleggers and oldest families in the Tomahawk area are some of the topics. The Keg farm story is amazing. Mac Winker shared the book with us. WJJQ also will be involved with trivia questions. The celebration will include a morning parade in Merrill Oct. 19. The museum will be open 9 a.m. to noon. There also will be geocaching.

To accommodate people who can't visit our museum during our limited hours, we hold special evening Wine and Cheese Nights. Teachers new to our school district were among the visitors Aug. 21. Our next event is from 4-7 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 25. Please join us!

You may have heard of the Shoe Drive we're holding as a fundraiser for the new museum building project. A company in Florida pays us per pound for gently-worn shoes. It's a win-win. The shoes are then sent to developing countries. If more come in during these final days we could donate close to 5,000 pairs of shoes! Trig's is the drop-off location.

We received a \$3,000 grant from the Tomahawk Community Thrift Stop for the new museum, and a \$525 donation from the THS Class of 1969 following their 55th reunion. The Grill, a new restaurant on Hwy. 8, donated \$500 to the current museum for continued upkeep. An earlier \$5,000 grant from the Thrift Shop helped with current building repairs. Thanks so much for the needed support!

TAHS featured the Lake Ice Bear, Bill Sparr's Chevy Corvette Convertible and a walking "shoe, calling attention to our Shoe Drive in this year's July 4 Parade.
